### **BLACK HISTORY MONTH 2024**

This year, the City of Edmonton, Africa Centre, Edmonton Community Foundation, and Edmonton Heritage Council partnered to provide resources to amplify and support the efforts of organizations that work to uplift Black communities.

The Anti-Black Racism Plan recommended that the City of Edmonton work with community to institutionalize the month-long commemoration of Black History Month. Black History Month is a special moment for Edmonton, recognizing the legacy of African, Caribbean, and Black Canadians and their communities in our city.

### **Edmonton Living Rooms**

The permanent virtual exhibition of *Edmonton Living Rooms* expands upon the previous in-person exhibitions developed in partnership with the Multi-cultural Health Brokers Co-op and funded by the Government of Canada. The exhibition highlights the stories of seven refugee and newcomer communities, including compelling narratives from African diaspora communities (such as those of Sierra Leone, South Sudan and Eritrean backgrounds). This rich online resource welcomes visitors to explore stories of celebration, grief, and beauty.









# And Still We Rise – A Black Presence In Alberta, Late 1800s to 1970s

And Still We Rise explores the stories of Black Settlers to Alberta, starting in the late 1800s through to the early 1970s. The exhibition explores themes including arrival, changing social conditions, and challenging stereotypes, illustrating that Black Albertans are woven into the fabric of Alberta. Originally a physical exhibition developed and written by Dr. Jennifer Kelly, this virtual exhibition makes the photos, videos, and stories accessible to a wider audience.


