13. Did you consult with the broader Indigenous community and/or Elders to ensure this project is done in a respectful way? If yes, who did you consult/speak to? (max 150 words)
14. Does your project provide opportunities for land-based learning and/or generational learning? If so, how?
15. Does your project provide opportunities to access to cultural mentors, Elders, and/or knowledge keepers? If so, how?
16. Does your project create space for Indigenous peoples' real lived experiences to be shared and heard? If so, how?
17. Are Two Spirit people, women, youth, houseless folks, and/or Elders impacted by this project? If so, how?



18. Is there an opportunity for people in Edmonton to experience your project?

19. Will your project have a lasting impact on Indigenous folks in Edmonton and/or Treaty 6? If so, how?
20. Is this project a community need or priority? If so, explain. (max 150 words)
21. Do you have a backup plan in case COVID-19 regulations change?

## SECTION 2: ABOUT YOU

At EHC we understand that Indigenous identity can be complex, and that colonial system of verifying indigeneity such as blood quantum and status cards can perpetuate inaccuracies in understanding identity from the perspective of Indigenous communities. We also know that the emergence of non-Indigenous people claiming indigeneity to gain access to funds, industry, and connections has caused extreme harm to Indigenous peoples. Therefore, the following questions about indigeneity are important for us to ground our understanding of you, your work, and your application. If you have any questions or require further clarification, please contact us.

25. If you are applying as an individual:
  - Are you Métis, First Nations, Status, Non-Status, and/or Inuit?
  - What community are you from?
  - What is your relationship to amiskwacîwâskahikan (Edmonton)?
26. If you are applying as an Indigenous-led collective or registered non-profit society:
  - What is your organizational overview, summarizing the organization's activities over the past year, including programs, projects, and partnerships.
  - Include the names and bios of the Métis, First Nations, and/or Inuit members of your organization involved in this project, including the communities they are from.
  - Include the names and bios of the non-Indigenous members of your organization involved in this project.
  - What is your organization's history and current relationship to amiskwacîwâskahikan (Edmonton)?

These additional materials will help the jury members assess your project accurately. While only the grant budget form is required, we highly suggest uploading explanatory notes to the grant budget form, and any other materials (like letters from partners or a resume) you think would be helpful to your application.
