

Nominee Background & Statements of Interest Election to Board of Directors, AGM 2016 Edmonton Heritage Council

The Edmonton Heritage Council (EHC) Board of Directors provides for accountability in governance, strategic leadership, and the active community and civic participation of EHC in the Edmonton region. In recruiting for the Board of Directors, the EHC strives to reflect the diversity, vibrancy, and character of the city and region that we serve.

The thirteen (13) candidates have provided the following biographies and statements of interest in serving on the EHC board. Up to nine (9) vacancies will be filled by election at this year's Annual General Meeting on May 11, 2016.

Darrel Babuk

Darrel is the Principal of Boreas Architecture and Civic Design, working to preserve stories of Canadian heritage and achievement to be passed along to future generations. He is a public speaker, author, Board member of the Alberta Grain Elevator Society, and a Freemason, working to create a program of conservation for Edmonton's Freemasons Hall.

The son of a Canadian Pacific Railway Station Agent, Darrel grew up in Alberta train stations. A graduate of the Montana State University School of Architecture, he was elected as Vice President/Secretary/Treasurer of the American Institute of Architecture Students, taking a year away from studies to live and work at the American Institute of Architects headquarters in Washington, DC before beginning his architecture practice in Chicago, IL.

The interests and strengths that I would bring to the Edmonton Heritage Council's Board include interest in advocacy and promoting awareness of issues surrounding Edmonton's heritage, as well as identifying, cultivating and working with contacts to promote heritage, and working to integrate heritage into Edmonton's future.
